

Becoming A Disciplemaking Church

The purpose of disciplemaking

The pastors and leaders of Fairfield believe that each and every one of us in church is called to be a disciple. Because of this we have spent a great deal of time considering how the church can help us understand and express our discipleship. We have identified small group accountability, strong Word-based teaching and personal mentoring as the way we will train to be disciples in Fairfield. One way of putting the purpose of the disciplemaking process is to help us become men, women, boys and girls that are "filled with the knowledge of his will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so as to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God." (Col 1:9-10). As God's beloved children, we want to grow to become like our Heavenly Father and to do what He does. This desire for continuing growth in holiness is a mark that we truly belong to God (1 Pet 1:14, 1 Jn 3:10).

When we try to understand and express our discipleship, we should aim for growth both in spiritual maturity as well as an increasing commitment and love for the local church. In other words, our plans

and methods of making disciples should help us draw closer to God and to Fairfield Methodist Church as well. Of course, the latter is secondary to the former, but a discipleship programme that only helps us draw closer to God would not be any different from a discipleship programme by any other church or parachurch organization. So we should learn together about the ministries, activities and culture of Fairfield as members of a church family. This will help us grow to identify more closely with and to take a godly

pride in the people and place we belong to.

Christian fellowship in a deeper and more committed way. We consider small groups to be the key vehicle for disciplemaking in Fairfield. Because of this, we intend that participation in a small group become the norm for everyone in church.


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Small groups can be defined as gatherings of 3-20 people who regularly meet together. Existing small groups in church include the cells, Bible study groups and follow-up groups. The Children's Ministry and Youth Ministry also have age-level cells under teachers. There are many groups of people meeting in church, with different purposes and emphases. Some groups meet mainly to pray together. Some meet mainly for Bible study. Others mainly provide support through sharing of personal life issues. Yet others meet because of a shared ministry (e.g. the choir) or a particular area of interest (e.g.

It can be seen then that not all small groups in church have a specific goal to help their members grow in spiritual maturity. This is a normal state of affairs because the life of the church involves many kinds of small groups. Some small groups are not the right place for the kind of expression of Christian fellowship that the Bible talks

> about. Because of this we would encourage those of us whose small groups cannot focus on discipleship to also join a second small group that does. Those of us in small groups who could be focusing on discipleship can ask ourselves and one another in the same small group if we are able and willing to adopt this kind of focus. A small group that focuses on disciplemaking has a particular programme (what happens when the cell meets), a depth of spiritual

Celebrating As One Family

How does the world know that we are Christians? It is "by our love." Love is one of the marks of a Christian - an important element of a disciplemaking church. But the litmus test of this love is whether it is genuine or hypocritical, out of selfinterest or putting others' well-being first.

Wesley's general rules of "doing no harm, avoiding evil, and doing good of every possible sort" are ways to help us practice love in our lives. For Wesley, faith and works are two sides of the same coin.

As we celebrate our 65th church anniversary in 2013, we want to celebrate as ONE family in Christ - one loving family. How do we do that? Jesus says "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13: 34-35 - NRSV).

This is the only commandment Jesus explicitly identified for His disciples, which includes you and me. The world will know we are Christians by our love for one another.

But why is this a "new command"? Because the people of God did not have love for one another like they should have had. Jesus is basically saying, "You, who are My disciples, love each other. You, who believe in Me, love each other. You, who are My followers, love each other. You, who are members of My church, love each other."

This command to love one another is new because it is not a selfish love. The kind of love to which Jesus refers to is a selfsacrificial love. It is the kind of love that was exemplified in Jesus through His public and private ministry as He formed His disciples into a community of believers. It is also the kind of love that was exemplified in His Passion as He suffered and died for those believers and the entire world. The love we are to have for one another is love that is committed. It is love that does not have a self-serving agenda.

The church is about loving one another. This year, we want to grow as loving disciples – not only loving fellow worshippers across the different language services (English, Mandarin, Cantonese and China Nationals Ministry) in Fairfield - but also loving those who have stopped worshipping at Fairfield, loving our own inactive members and loving our community in Chinatown.

When we have love for one another, the world will see and know that we are Christians; that we belong to Jesus Christ. And this love which stems from Christ will compel us to love and serve our community in Chinatown.

So what does the world know about you? What does the world know about us?

As one Fairfield family, let us each do our part in giving attention to membership care and recovering "lost" members through our small groups, our ministry groups and any other informal groups. Together, let us "Celebrate As One Family" -"Following Christ, Making Disciples" that everyone will know that we are His disciples by our love.

RAISING FUND FOR CHURCH BUILDING

Our current premise at 1 Taniong Pagar Road serves as a reminder of God's faithfulness to Fairfield Methodist Church. It tells the story of God's divine intervention in how we managed to acquire the old Metropole Cinema for our worship services. It was truly a miracle that a group of senior members and leaders of the church could borrow the required funds from sister churches of TRAC to close the building purchase within a span of just six weeks!

Fairfield Methodist Church began as a chapel in Fairfield Girls' School at 178 Neil Road. The first Sunday School and Worship Service was held on Passion Sunday, 23rd March 1947 in the School Drill Hall - with only a square table covered with a white linen cloth as the worship centre. On the table top was placed a wooden cross crafted by Mr Yeo Ban Guat and a vase of flowers from the "Flame of the Forest" tree.

During those days, we worshipped only as a congregation until Fairfield began as a church on 1st February 1948 and started to worship in the school hall with spartan facilities.

We held our last Sunday Service in Fairfield Girls School on 8th June 1986 before we moved to 1 Tanjong Pagar Road. It was a major breakthrough when we were able to acquire our current premises in June 1986. God has strategically placed us in Chinatown to serve a community which has many spiritual and physical needs.

The land lease of No. 1 Tanjong Pagar Road expires in the Year 2027. Before that time, the church will need to decide if we wish to continue worshipping at the current premises or find another place to worship.

The option to remain at the current premises means the church must be prepared "to submit a suitable bid" to the Government to retain the premises. Based on estimation, \$10 million will be required to renew the land lease for another 30 years plus some renovation works to be done.

The alternative option would be for the church to find another suitable premise or a piece of land to build a new church building. With the rising land cost in land scarce Singapore as well as high construction cost, it only means that the church must have very deep pockets to consider seeking a piece of land and constructing a new church building.

Bearing in mind that whichever option the church chooses, most premises or land for place of worship is usually granted a term lease of only thirty years which means that our church must continuously accumulate funds to renew land lease every thirty years.

教会筹款活动

花菲卫理公会目前的教堂见证了神的信实。上帝显现了神迹,为我们预备金 华戏院,让我们在这里敬拜天父。上帝在短短的六个星期内让卫理教会筹得 足够的基金以签下租赁合约。

花菲聚会在花菲女子学校开始,并开办于1947年3月23日。当时只有一组主 日学和每星期天一堂主日敬拜。花菲聚会是在1948年2月1日正式成为花菲卫 理公会。

在1986年6月8日,花菲靠着上帝的恩典搬到丹戎巴葛现在的地点。神的旨意 是要花菲在牛车水一带服侍贫困的居民。

丹戎巴葛路1号的土地租赁将在2027年到期。在此之前,教会将需要决定, 我们是否应该继续在现有的地方敬拜,或是找一个地方。

如果我们选择留在现有的地方敬拜,教会必须向政府提出申请并提交进标 价。这估计应该需要大概1000万元以续30年土地租赁合约和一些装修工程。

虽然我们可以找一块适合的土地来建立一间新的教堂,但是,因为教会资金 有限, 所以我们没法履行这个想法。

我们必须知道所有租借的土地的租赁期限只有30年,而这意味着,我们的教 会必须不断地积累资金,以便在每三十年更新土地租赁合约。

在这期间,教会的成员也应为教会提供帮助,使我们有足够的资金在2027年 作出决定和计划。

花菲的会众都要承担建立教会的责任。我们将举办不同的活动以鼓励其他机 构和朋友给予我们教会支持。我们要借着这些活动来传扬花菲弟兄姊妹之间 的爱以及上帝的神迹。

为了这次的筹款活动,我们委员会设计了一本日记。它展示了我们教会中一 些摄影师的摄影作品。这体现了他们对主的爱,和服侍主的忠心。

筹款活动包括了高尔夫球比赛和筹款晚宴。我们需要会众的支持。大家齐心 协力、委员会相信我们的神是信实的、他必定会引导我们忠心地侍奉他。

While the leaders ponder over the future of the FFMC premises, the members of this church must also play an active part to help FFMC build up our resources so that we will have sufficient funds to make a decision come Year 2027.

It is important that members of FFMC become aware of the need to share the responsibility of securing the premises for worship as a church. Besides seeking regular contributions from the members, the Building Fund Committee will organise projects and events to seek contributions from well-wishers outside FFMC. The Committee hopes to use these events to develop a COMMON HEART within the congregation to uphold the heritage of FFMC and to pass on the culture and values of the FFMC family to the next generation.

The first project organised by the Committee is the production and sales of "REFLECTIONS - THE JOURNAL". This production features

the selected works of FFMC members who are also photography enthusiasts. It is a showcase of their God-given talents and demonstrates their passion to use their gifts to contribute to this Church.

Other events in the pipeline are fun-filled Novelty Golf Outing and Building Fund-Raising Dinner - which will need the active participation from our members.

FFMC had come a long way from worshipping as a small congregation in a spartan environment to worshipping at our current premises at No. 1 Tanjong Pagar Road. With a COMMON HEART, the Committee trusts that God will remain faithful to us to help us be sufficiently prepared to serve Him.

Q: Rev Lim, tell us more about how you started in ministry.

Although hailing from a 'kampong', a small town in Batu Pahat, my life-long passions in pursuing the Lord, His missions and making disciples has brought me to big cities. Whilst a student in Australia from 1982-1989, I had the privilege to start a new Christian Pentecostal Ministry, Deakin University Students for Christ, in my university. I was also instrumental in starting up the first Asian church in Geelong, Victoria.

Q: How did you even find time to study?

Yes, amazingly I graduated from Deakin University and also Geelong Bible College Australia. Subsequently, I became a full time missionary to Australia as a staff to Vic/ Tas Students for Christ holding the post of Deakin University Campus Director.

Q: What brought you to Singapore?

In 1992 I came to Singapore as a missionarypastor to a then new and fast growing church. Since coming to Singapore I have served as a pastor in two different independent churches. I have always a passion for discipleship and missions, and I am blessed to be able to be involved in discipleship, church planting, missions and leadership training in various countries in this South East Asia region.

Q: What are some of the training you received in preparation for ministry?

I received my Master of Arts (Biblical Studies)



from Singapore Bible College in 1999 and Master of Divinity from East Asia School of Theology in 2001. When the Centre of Study of Christianity in Asia (CSCA) of Trinity Theological College was birthed in 2001, I was admitted as the first pioneering batch to pursue the Master in Theology (Missions in Asia) and graduated in 2003.

Q: Having been in several Methodist Churches, do share with us some of your experiences there.

As a Methodist pastor, I helped launched the Men's Accountability Network in Bedok MC (BMC), the Men's Breakfast Fellowship in Ang Mo Kio MC (AMK MC) and the Men's Fellowship in Agape MC (AgMC). I was the missions pastor in both AMK MC and Agape MC. I oversee the Year of Missions in AMK MC where more than 20 mission short trips were made and 2 more missionaries sent out, and the church became involved in four more other countries under my mission team. I also count it a joy to be given the opportunity to oversee the young ones like the Young Adults in BMC and the Youth in AgMC.

MyTRAC Duties include being the committee member in the Local Preachers Training and TRAC LEAD Prophetic Prayer Team. I am the Chairman of TRAC Crisis Relief Task Force and a committee member of the Board of Outreach and Social Concerns. I am also a member of Methodist Missions Society Personnel Committee.

Q: Aside from being in ministry, what else do you enjoy?

I like to play table tennis, badminton and volleyball. I am also an enthusiastic movie watcher and likes listening to pop music and appreciates arts.

Building Roots, Bearing fruits: Reflections on Youth Ministry

Youth ministry, like most other ministries in the church, is a time and labor intensive area of service. This is mostly due to the fact that the average age of the people in this ministry is significantly lower than various other ministries in the church (with the exception of the tots class and children's ministry), and the energy level of the youth is also correspondingly higher. As such, it is understandable that serving in the youth ministry requires a great deal more energy and effort as compared with other areas of service in the church.

Youth work is especially crucial because most of these young people will be experiencing an influx of changes for the first time, not merely the physical aspects but mental and emotional ones as well. These changes concomitantly bring about a struggle for identity and a need to find community, a place for them to belong. The youth ministry thus has a responsibility to foster this community and create a safe place for the youths to be honest about their struggles; a place where they are guided to look to Jesus Christ, in whom they can find their identity, security and all. We do this not just by teaching about Him but by actively modelling a life of fullness, a fullness which comes from Christ, in whom the fullness of God was manifested (Colossians 1:19).

The challenge for us as leaders then, is to constantly demonstrate Christlikeness and model what it means to be transformed by the renewing of our minds (Romans 12:2). It is never only about having a good curriculum but also about becoming leaders that strive for excellence towards God's standards. Since spiritual formation is something that cannot be taught, I am inclined, after reflecting on my service, that the best way to make an impact is to show, not just to tell. As Rev Edmund Chan's oft quoted aphorism states, "Truth does not change lives. Truth applied changes lives". So, as leaders, even as we are people responsible for teaching biblical truth, may we also demonstrate the power of that truth in our lives by living it out, through the Spirit and grace of God working in us.

This, thus, is the youth leader's call: in alignment with the theme verse for next year, that is, Jeremiah 17:7-8 "Blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when the heat comes, for its leaves remain green and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit." The call to build deep roots is a call to abiding and trusting in Christ (John 15:5), that we may bear fruit (Galatians 5:22-23). This twofold process of learning and living begins with the leaders and is modeled for the youth.

The burden of discipleship and nurturing however, does not merely fall on the shoulders of the youth leaders alone, it is one that the whole church as God's community is responsible for. The idea of modelling is neither a new concept nor one that operates in silo. We need to think about modelling Christlikeness outside our ministry roles, especially for the adults, who may be spiritually more

experienced, to be examples for the younger ones to emulate. Our behavior and attitudes do not merely reflect our individuality, but shapes the culture of our community at large as well, a culture which in turn, will be passed on to the next generation. It is thus imperative to consider what kind of culture we as the church are shaping for the next generation, and take the necessary actions to ensure that it is a culture that we can be proud of passing on.

We live in a world where it is easy to know truth but a million times more challenging to live truth. When the rubber meets the road, it is always so much easier to be comfortable where we are - in passivity and inaction - as opposed to standing up for what God's truth requires of us. It is a call to model for our future generation and shape a culture that they are to inherit, and a call to build deep roots and bear fruit for Christ as a church, by the grace and Spirit of God, for His glory.

1996: Yong-en Care Centre registered on 4 September Care Cell Ministry launched on 6 October

1998: Mandarin Service started in January PowerKids Ministry started Glowing Years Ministry (GYM) started on 28 June

2000: Yong-en Care Centre official opening on 25 November










Mrs Angelina Singam


RW: I guess it is a place where I have good friends whom I could bond and support each other. It is also a place I could have a sense of belongingness, recognition and participation with the church people and the activities.

Cantonese Service 1. Mdm Oh Soon Hoe **Date Deceased** 13 December 2012 accountability of members to one another and a certain intent and drive from the leader of the cell. To help us know what to aim for, the pastors and leaders have identified three key features of a disciplemaking small group:

- A <u>programme</u> where there is both deep sharing of life experiences as well as Bible-based teaching. Scripture is applied and becomes relevant to real life. Members will understand how God works in their lives from day to day. Leaders will help members connect truth with life by learning how to ask questions that encourage active discussion and creating "holy moments" when God's presence and power can be known during group meetings.
- Authentic <u>relationships</u> with trustful sharing of personal issues, honesty, care-giving and active listening to one another. When conflict occurs, members face tensions and disagreements with direct loving communication, rather than letting resentment, hidden emotions, and unresolved anger break up the group. Members want the best for each other, will serve one another and tell the truth to one another in love to help one another grow. They affirm the work of God in each other's lives.
- The <u>culture</u> of the group involves a good balance between mutual caring at their point of need and maturity as well as challenging one another to grow. In caring for one another, group members help each other in the midst of and in recovering from crises. They give long-term mutual support. In challenging one another, they intentionally model Christlikeness and help one another achieve spiritual goals.

Joining a small group like this can be scary! There has to be a certain willingness to move out of our comfort zone to grow together. It is easy to stay the way we are and keep our Christian life restricted to Sunday mornings. It can be hard to take the risk of experiencing the heights of joys and depths of pains that characterize Biblical fellowship. But I believe many of us are not moved by vague plans and nice-sounding suggestions. Rather, we are thrilled by worthy challenges and a clear understanding of what the Bible tells us we can become. We can sense the truth that we need one another in church in a deeper way. Even if we do not feel ready to commit ourselves to a group like this yet, we can start praying about where we are going next in our Christian growth. And as we pray for light on the journey, remember that our faith is not a solo effort - it is a group project! This is a project that should help us to grow in love for God as well as for one another as members of the Fairfield family.

成为培训门徒的教会

培训门徒的意义

花菲卫理公会的牧者及领袖认为教会中的每位弟兄姊妹都是被呼召成为门徒的,因此,我们花许多时间思考教会能够如何更好地帮助我们培训门徒并理解当中的意义。我们已建立了丰富的教学资料,并制定了多彩的各人培训方式,培训花菲卫理公会的弟兄姊妹成为门徒。培训门徒的主要因素是帮助我们成为"在一切属灵的智慧悟性上,满心知道神的旨意。好叫我们行事为人对得起主,凡事蒙他喜悦,在一切善事上结果子,渐渐地多知道神。"(歌罗西书1:9-10)作为神的儿女,我们要成为更象天父一样,行他所行的。这种渴慕与神亲近、致力学习象他的目标就代表了我们是他的子民。"(彼得前书1:14;约翰一书3:10)

当我们试图理解门徒培训,我们应该把目标放在属灵成熟度上,以及对本地教会的责任与关爱。换言之,我们培训门徒的计划和方法应该使我们能够亲近神和教会。当中,前者是重点所在,而每间教会的门徒培训计划是大同小异的,因此,我们应该在花菲卫理公会的大家庭里,一起学习。这将更好的意识到我们的归属感并引以为豪。

小组生活

我在上一期提到,家庭小组能帮助我们在属灵上成长并鼓励大家参与其中。如此一来,我们可以更深层地经历在基督里的团契。在华菲,我们认为家庭小组是门徒培训的关键,正因为如此,我们鼓励大家成为家庭小组的成员。

小组可被定义为3-20人常聚的小型聚会。教会现有的家庭小组包括了,查经小组和跟进小组。儿童部和青年部也有根据年龄层次分配并有教师带领的小组。有许多人带着不同心态和想法来到教会。有些小组主要聚在一起祷告,有的则是查经,也有其他小组通过分享个人在生活上的经历来给彼此提供支持,还有一些小组因为不同的服侍事项(例如,诗歌领唱)而聚在一起。

因为教会涉及到不同的家庭小组,而不是每个家庭小组都拥有共同门徒培训的目标。这是种自然的现象;有些小组并不是很注重圣经中基督团契的重点,因此我们鼓励属此类的小组成员积极参与门徒培训的小组当中。在培训门徒的小组成员应时常互相提醒彼此,有关培训门徒的重点。当一个小组将中心点放在培训门徒的事项上时,小组不仅会有各项有程序的培训节目,并且成员都会在灵命成长方面互相负责与勉励。另外,小组组长也会有一定的魄力和动力。教会的牧者与领袖就针对培训门徒的家庭小组制定了以下三项事项:

- 推广以圣经为基础,并能够让门徒分享生活经历的<u>培训程序</u>。如此一来,我们才能将圣经的教导实行于生命中。小组组长可鼓励成员们在小组当中积极讨论。
- 小组成员建立互相信任、关怀,彼此聆听的良好关系。当小组成员 遇到意见不同的时候,与其互相憎恨、吵架,不如以爱互相包容, 并一起鼓励和成长。这样一来,他们在彼此的生活中将神的施工确 定起来。
- 家庭小组本身的独特文化是在相互关怀以及彼此成熟度上取得平衡。小组成员相互鼓励,一同成长,如此便会渐渐培养出基督的样式,并相互帮助取得灵命上的进步。

我们必须愿意走出自己的舒适地带,并一起成长。安于现状并把自己局限于星期天的敬拜是最简单不过了,但是,我相信我们并不是安于现状的,相反的,我们是勇于迎接挑战的。我相信即使我们还没做好加入小组的准备,我们仍是可以开始祷告,让神带领我们,而当我们祷告时,我们应切记这并不是个人的功劳,而是大家的功课。这是一项帮助我们在神的爱里成长的工程。

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
